Report to the parents and community of Marina View School

Marina View School is committed to the *New Zealand Curriculum* (NZC) vision for all children to be confident, connected, actively involved lifelong learners. The intention of the school motto *"Learning for Life"* is to engage children in purposeful and authentic learning. The school aims to support children to be effective learners, thinkers and communicators, and globally minded, resilient citizens.

Students participate and learn in caring, inclusive and collaborative learning communities that are strongly child-centred. Responsive teaching effectively supports and promotes student learning across the curriculum. There is a particular emphasis on supporting students to develop digital knowledge, technological fluency, and productive and critical thinking. The curriculum is personalised and based on children's interests, needs and strengths. As a result, children are highly engaged and enjoy a breadth of learning opportunities.

Students achieve very well in relation to other school valued outcomes. Children: demonstrate caring relationships with adults and peers collaborate with, learn from, and support the learning of others display self-motivation and regulation in their learning are reflective and creative thinkers.

The leadership team work effectively and collaboratively. Leadership expertise promotes very good systems, practices and processes to improve teaching and learning. Leaders have established clarity and shared understandings, around the school's goals, purpose and direction, that enable high level strategic thinking. Leaders and teachers make very good use of external expertise and connections, to build capability and sustain ongoing improvement and innovation. Relational trust at every level of the school supports collaboration, risk taking and openness to change.

Te Tiriti o Waitangi underpins the school's vision, values and strategic direction, with a particular school wide commitment to the principle of partnership. All students are affirmed in their language, culture and identity. Te reo me ngā tikanga Māori are woven through school programmes and interactions. Strong tuakana-teina interactions enhance children's learning.

Strong partnerships for learning have been established with the community, and globally through learning relationships with schools in Korea and China. Partnerships with parents and whānau are valued as the key to establishing positive outcomes for students.

The school is a signatory to the *Pastoral Care of International Students*) Code of Practice 2016. The school provides international students with pastoral care processes of a high standard. They receive very good quality English language support. International students integrate well into the school's educational programmes. They immerse themselves in all aspects of school and community life.

Trustees have clarity around their roles and responsibilities. The board is well informed to support decision-making that is focused on improving outcomes for students.

About the School... ...

Marina View School is a lively and vibrant full primary school (Years 1 to 8), where children are engaged in a wide range of exciting learning experiences.

Teachers and students at Marina View are enthusiastic about learning and undertaking new challenges. A snapshot of school life and activities can be seen on our website www.marinav.school.nz.

Currently we have a roll of approximately 750 students who make up 30 classrooms and a staff of 60. We have students from a variety of cultures and nationalities which makes our school a rich and exciting place to be.

We are a well resourced school with a range of facilities that cater for our students current and future learning needs.

Our school enjoys an excellent community reputation. Staff and students are continually aspiring towards excellence and our results show consistent achievement well above New Zealand national norms.



Enrolments

Marina View has an accommodation problem with more students wishing to enrol than there are places available. Because of this we have an Enrolment Scheme.

This is a Ministry of Education requirement in order to ensure spaces at Marina View School are for those children in our immediate vicinity.

Our enrolment scheme defines **TWO** criteria for 11.00am enrolment

- 1. Children within the catchment zone—those 12.30pm streets bounded by Luckens Rd, Hobsonville Rd 12.40pm (East side) and Marina View Drive cul de sacs leading off these roads, and West Harbour Drive 1.25pm (from Luckens) Road to Nos 108 and 125.
- 2. Children accepted through a Ministry approved Ballot scheme.

Placement

Our criteria for placing children in a particular room Absenteeism results in lost learning opportunities.

With rapid roll growth it is sometimes unrealistic to maintain class continuity in New Entrant rooms. In these rooms continuity is maintained until class size forces movement of some children to other rooms. This process always includes clear communication with parents before decisions are made.


Integrated Curriculum

Mathematics and Statistics

In Mathematics and Statistics, students explore relationships in quantities, space, and data and learn to express these relationships in ways that help them to make sense of the world around them.

English

In English, students study, use, and enjoy language and literature communicated orally, visually and in writing

Special Programmes

Library:

We are proud of our Library. All students visit the Library regularly.

Learning support:

Children in need of learning support are identified very early and given programmes appropriate to their need. This may involve individual or small group assistance.

Learning extension:

We run a number of extension programmes, across the school, to cater for the students who show talent in various curriculum areas. As well as in-class extension, withdrawal programmes are organised to cater for special ability students.

English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL):

Students who are non English speaking receive extra support within the classroom setting and through specialist small group instruction. This assists with their English language acquisition.

Music, Dance and Drama

We employ specialist teachers who deliver amazing programmes in Music, and Dance & Drama.

Life Choices:

This programme for Year 5 and 6 classes is taught by volunteer teachers following the official Churches in Schools programme for 30 minutes per week. Parents, need to complete a permission form if they wish their child to participate.

Junior School Programmes:

- Perceptual Motor Programme: for Year 1 students aimed at improving their co-ordination.
- Quick Sixty Reading: an intensive Programme aimed at our younger readers who need most support.

Senior School Programmes:

For Years 7-8 we operate from a philosophy of targeted specialisation. In short, we:

- * Utilise staff strengths and enthusiasm
- Provide specialist classroom programmes in: Digital learning, music, languages and sport
- * Employ staff who have a special interest in the development of intermediate aged children
- * Offer targeted support and extension programmes.
- Have a weekly options programme that extends the children's range of experiences that are not commonly available in schools.
- * Provide opportunities for students to be involved in a range of activities where they develop their leadership skills.


New Entrants

Communicating with the School

The Marina View School Senior Management Team is made up of the Principal and 2 Deputy Principals. They are more than happy to talk with parents. Parents who have concerns, or require information about the school, should first contact the school Receptionist. A telephone call to the Principal may be all that is required. However, if parents wish to have a personal interview, an appointment time needs to be made. All parents/caregivers wishing to visit a child or classroom, must first call in at the School Office for a visitor's pass. This is to maintain school security and to protect our students.

Attendance / Absences

If children are absent for any reason, parents are asked to log their absence via the school website 'Absences' button. If your child is absent and we receive no notification, the school will ring you for verification before 10.00am. Students leaving the school grounds during the school day will need to sign out at the office where the parents/caregivers will meet them. Regular attendance at school is very important. For your children to gain the most benefit from their time at school, they need to attend regularly. If a child attends for less than 90% of each term we will contact parents to discuss the reasons for this. The Board's basic responsibilities include:

The Board meets once per month. Meetings are held in the boardroom and parents are welcome to attend. Board elections are held every 3 years.

A regular homework habit instills self-discipline and reinforces the skills and knowledge learned at school. The amount of work set will vary according to the class level, the need and subject. It will vary between 10 minutes for Year 1/2 to up to 40 minutes for Year

Our well stocked Library is used extensively for both class lessons and recreational reading. All students are encouraged to borrow books for pleasure and research. We have an excellent computer data base enabling students to access both books from the Library as well as teacher resource material.

Reporting to Parents

Frequent communication on student progress is vital to ensure home and school are working together in the education process. Besides the frequent informal discussions which occur in general day to day contact between parents and teachers, the more formal reporting process includes Goal Setting Meetings in Term 1, online reports at end of Term 2 and Term 4, and Parent/Teacher interviews at the beginning of Term 3. Parents also have ongoing access to their child's learning throughout the year on Linc-ed.

Road Crossing

All children and parents are expected to use the pedestrian crossing when wanting to get to the other side of the road. Year 7-8 Road Patrol students supervise the crossing and assist younger pupils. Please listen and don't cross until you hear " Cross Now". Parents are rostered to assist in the mornings 8.30—8.50am, and a staff member assists in the afternoons 2.55—3.15pm. If you are available to help, please contact Mrs Bergin-Stuart (Deputy Principal) who co-ordinates this programme.

Stationery

There are different requirements at each level. When enrolling you will receive a stationery list. We stock a limited amount, but you can buy some stationery form the school office from 8.15am to 9.00am daily. Stationery is carried for Years 1 and 2, so other stationery needs will be purchased outside the school.

2020 Fees

To maintain the high standard of facilities and educational opportunities Marina View offers, it is necessary to supplement the grant we receive from the Ministry of Education by way of a voluntary school donation (which is tax deductible), and activity fees.
